# WHAT IS HOPE?

Those of a certain age learnt about our faith through the questions and answers of the Catechism of Christian Doctrine. There is a question, What is hope?'. And the answer, 'Hope is a supernatural gift of God, by which we firmly trust that God will give us eternal life and all means necessary to obtain it, if we do what he requires of us'.

The next question is this, 'Why must we hope in God?". 'We must hope in God because he is infinitely good, infinitely powerful, and faithful to his promises. The more recent Catechism of the Catholic Church confirms this: 'Hope is the confident expectation of divine blessing and the beatific vision of God' (cf. CCC 2090). The Catechism then goes on to speak of despair, which is the cessation of hope in forgiveness and salvation. It also speaks of presumption, which is an understanding of salvation based on our own capacities and without the graces of conversion and the merit of virtue.

We may learn so much from these few words of the two catechisms. Hope is rooted in our relationship with the Lord. We live in an age that has almost lost touch altogether with the supernatural. We sense it is all down to us, and there is a diminished eschatological sense. We even see signs of this within our communities of faith. We might pray for a deepening of the theological virtue of hope. Despair and presumption are the two abiding forces against hope at work within our human nature.

The Scriptures constantly focus our hearts and minds on the need to deepen hope. This begins in the Garden of the Fall (Genesis 3). The image of the woman striking the serpent's head was called the protoevangelion by the early Church Fathers. This is the promise of salvation and God's desire to fulfil his plan for us, despite sin.

There is a beautiful liturgical expression of this in the Easter Exsultet, 'O happy fault that earns so great, so glorious a Redeemer!'. In fact, let the liturgy and its lectionary be our teacher here. Look to the Easter Vigil readings, psalms and prayers. They are bursting with a true understanding of hope. The Gospels are the fulfilment of the promises made to us by God. They are the flowering of the hope of generations as they looked forward to what the Lord would bring about. Our lives, as disciples of Christ, are meant to be convicted by these mysteries of faith.

Within a society radically anchored to life within the present moment, it is difficult for us to imagine what life will be like in the future. We often find ourselves trapped within the anxieties of what may have happened in our past and fear of what is to come. And if we are imprisoned within one of the many ancient, yet strangely current, "isms" of our age-gnosticism, pelagianism, jansenism-our pastoral encounters descend into the myopia of what we may achieve by ourselves. An encounter with the healing love of the Lord enables us to imagine something different. And this is what hope is about.
